Register now for the Midyear Leadership Conference

The 5th Annual Midyear Leadership Conference will be held February 3-5, 2006 in the Hilton St. Louis Airport at 10330 Natural Bridge Rd., St. Louis, Missouri. Guests arriving by air transportation are encouraged to utilize the Hilton shuttle service from the St. Louis airport to the hotel.

Conference participants need to arrive Friday afternoon in time for the opening reception starting at 5:30 p.m. (Central Standard Time). Meetings will be held Friday night and Saturday and checkout will be Sunday morning.

The Midyear Leadership Conference is designed specifically for recently elected chapter sages and third counselors. This is the reason we hold the conference at the beginning of February after new officers have taken their positions. We will also have special programming for our chapter directors, province archons, and for the first time, alumni club delegates. These sessions will help them develop leadership in their chapters. The Grand Council and Educational Foundation boards will also be present for the conference which is designed to be interactive, informational and motivational. The objective is to make it a positive and enjoyable experience for every attendee.

The hotel and registration fees for the sages, third counselors, chapter directors, province archons, and one delegate from each chartered alumni club are covered by Sigma Pi. This includes the cost of the hotel room, opening reception, Saturday breakfast and lunch. Chapter officers and alumni volunteers will have to be on file with the Executive Office as holding these positions at their chapters and in the provinces to receive complimentary lodging. Substitutes are allowed, but must be discussed beforehand by contacting Jonathan Frost at (800) 332-1897

Any member of Sigma Pi Fraternity may attend; but if you are not a sage, third counselor, chapter director, province archon, or an elected alumni club delegate you are invited to attend but you must pay a registration fee of \$75 and must cover your own lodging expenses.

Sigma Pi Fraternity must have an advance registration and ALL participants must register via www.sigmapi.org. There will be NO on-site registration at the event. Unregistered people showing up will not be allowed to participate in the events. Please understand we must have exact headcounts for the hotel with meeting rooms, meals, and ground transportation. The Midyear Leadership Conference is purely voluntary and there is not a penalty for absence. You will be missing a wonderful opportunity to meet other Sigma Pi officers and gain valuable training, but we understand that sometimes schedules will be in conflict. If you will not be able to attend or send anyone from your chapter simply call Jonathan Frost, and let him know. This will ensure us to strike your chapter off the list and prevent further follow up phone calls.

We want to remind everyone interested in attending the 5th Annual Midyear Leadership Conference that sages, third counselors, chapter directors, province archons, and one elected delegate from each chartered alumni club are NOT required to send payment.

Members other than the recorded sage, third counselor, chapter director, province archon, or elected alumni club delegate must provide a \$75 registration fee prior to securing

as room for the event. The \$75 registration fee includes: Friday evening opening reception, Saturday breakfast and lunch, and a shuttle transportation to an from downtown St. Louis, along with a conference workbook and materials. Saturday night dinner will not be covered by the Fraternity; it will be a self-incurred expense.

After registering online with the Executive Office, these members will be able to book a room at the Airport Hilton for the rate of \$73.33 per night. All rooms are double occupancy.

Cancellations

A \$50.00 (US) fee will be charged to process any registration package cancellation after February 1, 2006. Registering for the event and failing to attend will result in a \$125 fine being assessed to the Chapter. Many of you will be back in school by the time you read this, some of you will still have a few days of vacation left. Either way there is still plenty to plan for to help keep this year one of our best ever.

This past fall was a great semester for Sigma Pi in terms of recruitment. We had 11 chapters already meet or surpass their pledge goals for the year and 5 of those initiated enough (80%) from their fall pledge class to reach their initiate goals as well. This is spectacular because they still have another semester of recruitment to help them grow even more. There are also a great number of you that are close to meeting your goals, if you are not sure of your chapter goals contact your ELC or the Executive Office. Remember recruitment helps us grow nationally as a fraternity but more importantly it helps your chapter ensure its place on your campus. We do need to get some ACE Projects completed. We currently only have 18

chapters that have completed an ACE Project. This is a Sigma Pi only event but without Sigma Pi chapters completing one it is not going to get to the campuses. Last year we finished the year with 87 chapters completing a project and this year our goal is 100. We even had alumnus Jon Eyres (Σ , Iowa State '03) design a new brochure that was sent out to schools to show off what you guys have done. It has pictures you have sent in, letters from schools and it listed every chapter that had completed a project and activity performed. Our Fraternity has gained a lot of positive publicity because of what you have done. We would love to keep this up so that the country sees that Sigma Pi is not your average, stereotypical fraternity, but rather we are gentlemen who go above and beyond to give back to not only our community but our campuses. Get your ACE Chairman on top of this immediately and contact the school to see what you can do to help. Then go to www.sigmapi.org and register your project so we can get you your free banner to help highlight the event.

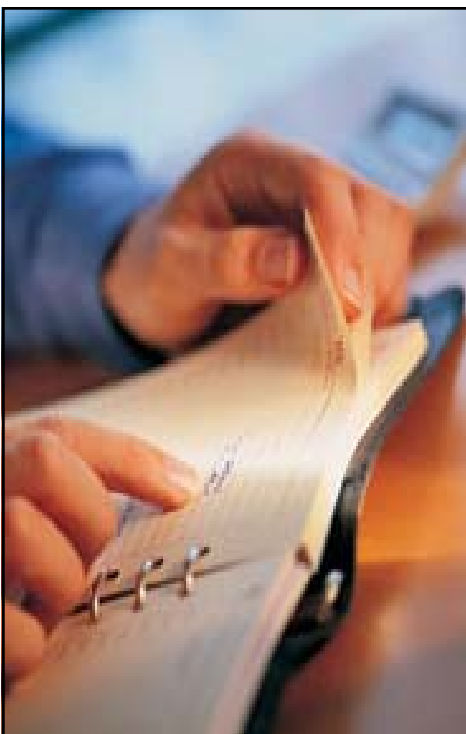

Fall Province Workshops A Success!

New Jersey / Long Island Province Workshop

On September 10, 2005, brothers from around New Jersey came together for the fall Provincial Workshop held on the Teaneck campus of Farleigh Dickenson University. In all, over 80 young men representing four chapters and two colonies were present to hear presentations from a variety of speakers. The four chapters in attendance were Alpha-Mu (NJIT), Delta-Beta (Monmouth), Delta-Epsilon (Seton Hall), and Theta-Delta (TCNJ). The two colonies present were the Epsilon-Xi Colony at Farleigh Dickenson University and the William Paterson Colony.

While a few "technical difficulties" were being worked out, Grand Fourth Counselor Chris Brown (ΓH, Rutgers '81) addressed the assembly on the state of Convocation. Given the disaster in New Orleans, many of the undergraduates were concerned about the state of our Grand Chapter's biennial meeting. As Chris finished his update and ensured the group that Convocation will take place in the Big Easy, our technical difficulties managed to work themselves out and the workshop was able to begin.

The first presenters were Province Archon Paul Gorman (ΔE, Seton Hall '96) and Chapter Director Joe Palazzolo (ΔB, Monmouth '03). Their presentation focused on the first of a three-part alcohol education series known as AWARE. The discussion centered on the Sam Spady tragedy and included the AWARE Lesson One test. Informational handouts were also given to the undergraduates for them to keep and study on their own time. The presentation ended with an update on student conduct in the wake of the Spady incident.

Lesson Two of the AWARE Program will be administered to the individual chapters and colonies by their Chapter and Colony Directors. The third and final installment of the AWARE Program will be presented at the province's spring workshop.

After the brothers broke for an interesting lunch at FDU, the workshop reconvened with a recruitment presentation by Zeta-Chi Chapter Director Justin Saponara (ΘΔ, TCNJ '02). Justin's presentation was followed by a presentation on Image by recent graduate Brian Murray (ΔB, Monmouth '05). After Brian and Justin presented, Sigma Pi Fraternity's Assistant Executive Director Jonathon Frost (ΔZ, Missouri – St. Louis '02) took the stage and talked to the assembly about new member education programs. Many of the undergraduates have commented that since Jon's presentation, there has been a drastic change in their chapters with respect to long-standing "traditions" on new member education. This is the type of positive result that the province was hoping to get out of Jon's presence at our workshop.

The final portion of the workshop consisted of multiple breakout groups on various topics. These groups included the ACE Project, a sage, second, and third counselor group, alumni development, a fundraising, community service, and philanthropy group, social presentation, and new member education. The facilitators for these groups included all of the alumni volunteers listed above and William Paterson Colony Director Tom Kessler (ΓΞ, West Virginia Tech '83).

After the workshop ended, there were two opportunities for the attendees to continue the day. First was a recruitment party held at the Alpha-Mu Chapter's fraternity house. There was also an Epsilon-Xi Colony-sponsored trip to an FDU sporting event. After these events, some of the brothers took over New York City before returning home to New Jersey!

Pennsylvania Province Workshop

The weekend of September 10th found the chapters and colonies of Pennsylvania traveling to Lock Haven in order to attend the annual fall workshop. This year's event ran from noon on Saturday until early Sunday afternoon. It was held at the university's Sieg Conference Center deep in the woods in Lamar.

In addition to several of the chapters, attendance included the pledges of our colonies at Ursinus College and Temple University plus a 15-man contingent from the Pennsylvania College of Technology in Williamsport, who are interested in establishing a colony. This college is affiliated with Penn State.

Saturday's agenda included many subjects concerning chapter management and recruitment. The highlight of the evening was a presentation by Grand Herald John Michelich (EΓ, Illinois Wesleyan '74) dealing with the fraternities newly initiated alcohol awareness program, AWARE. As a prosecutor, John was able to cover this subject with much personal experience when discussing the many legal ramifications.

In addition to the Grand Herald, other presenters included PA Kevin Stone (BΩ, Lock Haven '92), who also served as a most efficient host, PA Frank Fryburg (Θ, Penn State '49), PGS Don Cox (K, Temple '55), Eta-Theta Chapter Director Christian Miele (HN, Towson '04), Zeta-Alpha Alumni Comptroller Jack Chenoweth (H, Purdue '74) and Northeast ELC Justin Steele (EII, Christopher Newport '05)

Following dinner on Saturday night, the men from Theta-Epsilon at Indiana of Pennsylvania built a large bonfire outside where the delegates spent the rest of the night enjoying brotherhood.

On Sunday, PGS Fryburg conducted an initiation ceremony for five of IUP's pledges. This ended the program except for lunch.

In discussing the events with many of the attendees, there was a most positive response that they were returning to their respective campuses with many new ideas which would make this year a most successful one. In short, all agreed that it was time well spent.

Convocation on the Bayou - New Orleans 2006

Hurricane Katrina was not enough to prevent Sigma Pi from holding Convocation in New Orleans for 2006.

Over the last three months, we have all wondered what our plans would be after the devastation that Hurricane Katrina had on the Gulf Coast and New Orleans. In early November we were contacted by our host hotel, The Fairmont, who informed us that they were going to completely refurbish their property and that it would take almost a year. Unfortunately this meant that they would not be able to honor their contract and Sigma Pi would have to look at other properties to host the 48th Biennial Convocation. Within a couple of days the New Orleans Marriott contacted the Executive Office and offered a comparable package for our organization. On

November 18th, Grand Sage John Kitch and Executive Director Mark Briscoe visited the Marriott to do a site inspection and insure their property would be suitable. They found the Marriott to have recovered very well from the disaster and was a perfect facility for the 2006 Convocation.



The site inspection is an important prerequisite the Executive Office performs before each convocation but even more important with respect to this year as we wanted to make sure that the city had recovered enough for our attendees. While large areas of New Orleans are still devastated by the hurricane, Kitch and Briscoe found that the Airport and French Quarter had survived very well and were operational. An evening trip down Bourbon Street, which is only three blocks from the hotel, proved that the Cajuns are back in business and welcome visitors with open arms. Within the next nine months the city will continue to make progress and our commitment to remain in New Orleans will help to bring back this great city.
