Sigma Pi Adopts SAM Spady Foundation

Two years after the death of Samantha Spady, Sigma Pi Fraternity continues its partnership with the SAM Spady Foundation to educate all parents and students on the dangers of alcohol, specifically high risk consumption, and the signs and symptoms of alcohol poisoning.

During the 48th Biennial Convocation the delegates unanimously voted to adopt the SAM Spady Foundation as the new international philanthropy for Sigma Pi.

At a time when alcohol poisoning deaths are reaching an alarming level, the brothers of Sigma Pi decided that action was needed and that they could make a positive change.

As many of you will recall, Samantha Spady was a dynamic person by all accounts. High school class president, homecoming queen, talented artist, and friend to many, Sam had a wonderful and inviting smile and personality that made everyone around her feel comfortable and accepted. Spady was a young woman whose life included stellar school work, a strong work ethic and passion for serving others, as was demonstrated by her work with the DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) Program.

Amidst all of the excitement surrounding a weekend festivities, Samantha's life came to an unex-

pected and tragic end late in the evening that fateful Saturday night after she spent several hours socializing with friends. She died at the Sigma Pi house after consuming a lethal amount of alcohol at different locations, including our chapter house. The cause of death...alcohol poisoning.

"I am very excited to see our undergraduates continuing to support such a worthy cause," said Executive Director Mark Briscoe.

On the Monday following Convocation, Briscoe called Mrs. Spady, to inform her that Sigma Pi had adopted their foundation as the international philanthropy of Sigma Pi.

The news couldn't have come at a better time for the family. Mrs. Spady informed Briscoe that Colorado State University had just rescinded their pledge for funding that they had promised for the upcoming year. "I don't think I could have taken any more bad news and to hear that Sigma Pi has once again come through with support is very appreciated," said Mrs. Spady.

In order to record our unified support and compile our statistics on Ace of Spades cards distributed and money raised we ask that you report your event to the Executive Office via the ACE event summary located on the Sigma Pi web site.

Please start planning your alcohol awareness workshop (different



from your ACE Project) today by ordering your cards. All students need to know the basic warning signs and the more who know the better. With your help, there is no telling how many lives that we might be able to save.

You may order your wallet size cards directly from the Executive Office. The cost of the cards is 5 cents per card. For every card that is purchased 1.5 cents will be donated to the SAM Spady Foundation; a donation that will be specific to each chapter that orders cards.

If your chapter would like to raise money for the SAM Spady Foundation outside of the Ace of Spades cards, you can collect the money and make your check payable to the SAM Spady Foundation and send it to the Executive Office. The Executive Office will forward all monies raised to the Foundation.

Chapter Liability Insurance

Chapter liability insurance is due by November 1st, start planning now. Rates for 2006-07 are \$135 per man with a chapter surcharge of \$500. This is based on the Executive Office receiving those fees between November 1st and November 10th. After November 10th, rates will increase to \$145 per man. For those chapters that pay PRIOR to November 1st, the per man fee will be reduced to \$125. The chapter surcharge of \$500 is the same. Take advantage of the discount and get these monies into the Executive Office before November 1st.
